## **Mendip Local Plan Part 2: Local Green Spaces : Ringwell Meadows, Norton St Philip (OALSNSP004)**

### **Introduction**

1. An application was made to Mendip District Council in October, 2014 for Local Green Space designation for Ringwell Field. This application fully met the criteria for such designation under the policies set out in the NPPF/PPG.
2. This new application under LPP2 supersedes the previous application. It applies for LGS designation for the site defined by OALSNSP004 which subsumes Ringwell Field. The enlarged site is now described as Ringwell Meadows, and is shown here.



### **The Site**

3. The boundary of the site can be seen in the more detailed photograph and plan at Annex 1. The site is the area of land immediately below the houses in The Barton, and extends westwards down to Norton Brook, and beyond the brook to Ringwell Lane. It is enclosed by a rubble wall in Ringwell Lane and on the eastern side of Norton Brook by the properties in The Barton.
4. Under policy Q2 in the previous Local Plan, the site was designated as an 'Open Area of Visual Significance'. Under policy DP2 in Part 1 of the new Local Plan the site has become an 'Open Area of Local Significance'. This change from visual to local significance was intended to reinforce the importance of the site in terms of its value to the local community.

### **Criteria for Designation**

5. Mendip's published criteria for Local Green Spaces require that they

- are located in reasonably close proximity to the community they serve;
- do not represent an extensive tract of land;
- are not already (adequately) protected through other policies or designations;
- are demonstrably special and warrant special protection as a result of fulfilling at least one of the following roles:

- i. Protect an important public view towards or out from a significant local feature, for example a church or manor house, which aren't already protected by other designations;
- ii. A park, play area or recreation facility which makes a significant visual contribution to the street scene or character of the settlement;
- iii. An important part of the street scene or character of the settlement, for example spaces such as orchards or gardens within a village characterised by its open layout or sectioned form;
- iv. Contributing to an important public view into or out of an otherwise built up street scene;
- v. Offering informal recreation space (i.e. not a park or formal recreation facility) and/or tranquillity within a settlement, for example seating areas and riverbanks;
- vi. Being of local historical or cultural value to a settlement, for example land surrounding a memorial, cemeteries or allotments which aren't already protected by other designations.
- vii. Being valuable for the richness of its wildlife.

6. The site is now examined against each of these criteria, which it meets in full.

***It is located in close proximity to the community it serves***

7. The site is just inside the western boundary of the conservation area, and about two minutes walk from the church. The aerial photograph shows its location in relation to the church and to the listed buildings in The Barton and Ringwell Lane.

***It does not represent an extensive tract of land***

8. The site is a small group of fields with a combined area of about 2 acres.

***Its contribution to the settlement is not already protected through other policies or designations***

9. As noted above, under policy Q2 in the previous Mendip Local Plan, the site was designated as an 'Open Area of Visual Significance', and under policy DP2 in Part 1 of the new Local Plan it has become an 'Open Area of Local Significance'.

10. Recent attempts to develop Great Orchard (OALSNP003) - another strong candidate for LGS designation - have shown that Q2 protection has not been sufficient to deter landowners and developers from seeking to exploit high property values in Norton St Philip driven by its proximity to Bath. It is not yet clear how much further protection will be provided by OALS status. Under LPP2 the site has become eligible for LGS designation, and this is now essential.

***It is demonstrably special and warrants special protection as a result of fulfilling at least one of the following roles:***

- i. Protecting an important public view towards or out from a significant local feature, for



*example a church or manor house, which aren't already protected by other designations;*

*ii. A park, play area or recreation facility which makes a significant visual contribution to the street scene or character of the settlement;*

*iii. An important part of the street scene or character of the settlement, for example spaces such as orchards or gardens within a village characterised by its open layout or sectioned form;*

*iv. Contributing to an important public view into or out of an otherwise built up street scene;*

11. The site is certainly 'demonstrably special'. It fully meets the geographical criteria for LGS designation under paragraph 77 of the NPPF. Specifically, it is 'local in character, and significant because of its landscape value'. The fact that it comprises three privately-owned parcels of land, with no public ROW, does not diminish its value to the local community.

12. Apart from its long-established recognition as an 'Open Area of Visual Significance' the site was mentioned several times in the comprehensive analysis of the qualities of the NSP conservation area which was published by MDC in 2007 in its Conservation Area Character Appraisal. Paragraph 7.21 of the CACA says that there are four important green spaces in the conservation area, and that one of these is 'the field along the course of Norton Brook, on the east side of Ringwell Lane', i.e. Ringwell Meadows.

13. The CACA draws attention to the pleasant walk from the church along Ringwell Lane, past the site and listed buildings and up Chevers Lane, emphasising that Ringwell Lane is one of the oldest lanes in the village.



14. The site is immediately adjacent to several listed buildings. These are G2 listed Burrgate and Ringwell Cottages and the G2\* Ancient Monument (the Tudor Dovecote) which once belonged to G2 listed Manor Farm. The fields make a strong contribution to the visual appeal of the conservation area, blending harmoniously with the surrounding contours. The undeveloped nature of the site is in keeping with the loose-grained character of this part of the village.

15. As can be seen the site makes a major contribution to the visual appeal of the conservation area. It provides an ideal setting for the surrounding listed cottages and the Tudor Dovecote.

16. This applies also when looking back towards the church.

***v. Offering informal recreation space (i.e. not a park or formal recreation facility) and/or tranquillity within a settlement, for example seating areas and riverbanks***

17. Whilst Ringwell Meadows is not a publicly available recreation space its tranquillity is self-evident.

***vi. Being of local historical or cultural value to a settlement, for example land surrounding a memorial, cemeteries or allotments which aren't already protected by other designations***

18. The site is close to the location of the well documented battle of 'Phillips Norton' which preceded the Battle of Sedgemoor in 1685, and Ringwell Lane could become part of the proposed heritage trail to commemorate the Battle of Sedgemoor. For more historical background see the LGS application for Great Orchard (OALSNSP003).

19. The site is overlooked by a G2\* Ancient Monument (the Tudor Dovecote) which receives regular visits from archaeologists and historical societies.

**Conclusions**

20. Ringwell Meadows is a compact and well defined space in the centre of the conservation area. It is demonstrably special, with high landscape value. Its contribution to NSP has been recognised in the CACA, and by its categorisation under policy DP2 in the new Local Plan as an OALS. The site meets all Mendip's criteria for designation as a Local Green Space and it should be so confirmed under LPP2. Given the attempts made by developers in NSP to disregard Q2/DP2 safeguards such designation would further safeguard the site for the local community, and for future generations.

21. This application has the full support of the NSP Parish Council and is being submitted with the full knowledge of the landowners.
